Washington, D.C. - Today, the Veterans Education Project (VEP) offers its full support for Secretary Wilkie's proposed access standards for community care and emergency care. EANGUS believes these standards stay true to the intent of the MISSION Act from the Department of Veterans Affairs (VA). The VA MISSION Act was endorsed by over 30 veteran service organizations, passed with overwhelming bipartisan support (347-70 in the House and 92-5 in the Senate), and signed into law by President Trump in June 2018. The VA MISSION Act stabilizes and reforms VA's health care system by consolidating VA's community care programs, defining clear standards for when a Veteran can access care outside of VA, and initiates a review of the department's infrastructure. The law also aims to reform VA's reimbursement and record-sharing systems for community providers.

VEP is excited to see Soldiers being given more choices and freedom in how they choose to receive their care. We believe that continuing to expand options and streamlining the process from previous programs will help all Veterans, especially Veterans that reside in rural areas. VEP fully supports the direction that VA has taken to help make VA benefits more Veteran focused, and stand ready to assist VA in its smooth implementation on June 6 2019.
